Discovering Joy through Friendships: Sammy's Story

Friendships are important.

But for Heartspring's Community of Autism Resources and Education (CARE) Clubs participant Sammy, making friends wasn't always easy.

"Sammy didn't know how to play with other kids," said Melissa, Sammy's mother. "He struggled with pragmatic speech, eye contact, and social skills."

Melissa worried Sammy would have a difficult childhood. She feared that he wouldn't be able to communicate with teachers and peers at school. She worried he wouldn't be able to express his feelings, voice his concerns, or communicate his needs and wants.

She feared his entire life would be tainted by an Autism Spectrum Disorder diagnosis.

That fear grew as she witnessed his

vocabulary becoming more limited and his interest in socializing with other kids declining.

But when Melissa found Heartspring's CARE Clubs, her fear quickly turned into hope.

At Heartspring's CARE Clubs, sixyear-old Sammy felt like he belonged. By socializing in a controlled environment with other children impacted by autism, little by little, Sammy's world opened up.

Through peer-time, activities, and community outings, CARE Clubs participants practice communication and social skills by forming bonds and building relationships – and through this process, they learn the necessary skills they need for social and emotional development.

"Sammy quickly became one of the most social kids in the group," said Kalee Beal, Heartspring's CARE



Specialist. "He is everyone's best friend."

As Sammy learned to connect with peers, he found a passion for CARE Clubs and friendships. He loved making friends so much that now he now spends his free time at the library reading self-help books about building social skills and making friends.

"Three years ago, I was terrified that Sammy would never be able to carry on a conversation or make friends. Now Sammy tells me how excited he is to go to CARE Clubs each week to see his friends, who by the way, he wants to invite to his birthday party," said Melissa.

Now that Sammy has learned to take the skills outside of clubs into the classroom, he has also made friends at school. And most importantly, he has learned to clearly and freely communicate what he feels, thinks, wants, and needs with those around him.

To Melissa, that means everything.

A Parent's Testimony of Hope: Paul's Story

Before finding Heartspring, Paul struggled finding his place in the world.

But since then, he's discovering more and more joy in his life every day.

"The progress he's made is miraculous. Before Heartspring, he never took his protective equipment off. He would become aggressive. To see your child become so aggressive towards others and himself was heartbreaking."

According to Paul's parents, Paul's life turned around once he stepped on Heartspring's campus.

He grew and learned to regulate and manage his behaviors.

He blossomed.

"We have seen Paul thrive at Heartspring. When we last visited our son, we were so happy with his transformation from being attached to his protective equipment to not needing it at all. It's a huge step for him!"

Paul's parents attribute his success to the hard work of his staff who accompany him in his learning journey every step of the way.

"What we love the most about Heartspring is how the staff and personnel are devoted to making these kids' lives reach their utmost potential. His behaviors have gone down; his independence has gone up."

And the most rewarding part of witnessing Paul's growing success is knowing he's on his way to a happy, independent life.

Before, their days were consumed by worry and fear.

Now, their hearts are filled with promising hope for Paul's future.

"Seeing our son happy and smiling makes our lives so much easier. We know he's in good hands."





A Heartwarming Holiday Experience: Heartspring's First AAC Concert

On a chilly and windy December evening, the Heartspring Pediatric Services waiting area became a warm and cozy room full of excited faces.

A doting audience of family members, friends, and staff gathered around a makeshift stage filled with miniature chairs and colorful sparkles of Christmas lights.

"Thank you all for coming to our first AAC Caroling Concert!" exclaimed Speech-Language Pathologist Susan Todd.

In awe, the audience watched a group of four children taking small but confident steps to the 'stage.' Each one them carried a tablet, and each one was accompanied by an assistant.

And so, the show began.

With the cheerful joy and passion that accompanies the holiday season, the four children started to sing "Away in a Manger" – but not in the traditional sense.

The quartet 'sang' by repeating the song's words and phrases - which were modeled by Todd on a large picture-prompting board - by using their Augmentative and Alternative communication (AAC) devices.

AAC is a complex system of communication methods used to complement or replace verbal speech. Heartspring's speech therapy program helps children who struggle with verbal speech overcome speech deficits by learning to use AAC through the use of devices.

Despite the complexity of AAC, Todd likes to put a creative twist to it when she uses it in her therapy.

"Songs are a great way to facilitate language," Todd states.

Besides facilitating a heartwarming experience for families to share the joy of the holiday spirit, the AAC holiday concert also served a goaloriented purpose. The preparation, participation, and execution of the event was part of Todd's group therapy plan in which she integrates children's individual therapy goals into an immersive social experience.

"It's a more intense version of therapy where children get to have real-life experiences," says Todd with a big smile on her face as she reminisces on the fulfillment she felt when she watched the children perform.

Todd attributes the success of the event to the support she gets at Heartspring. "One of the great things about Heartspring is that you have an idea, and you are supported by everyone. The environment that is created is set for success: Heartspring creates experiences – not just the therapy."

"It was less than five minutes, but it was an emotional blur."

Slawson Family Competitive Integrated Employment and Music Building

To meet the needs of children with special needs and their families, we need more space. While we need more classroom space, both the Competitive Integrated Employment (CIE) and music programs are invaluable to our students' enrichment and preparation for life after Heartspring. Children build vocational skills through classroom work, school-based internships, and community-based internships.

Opening in April 2019, the Slawson Family

Competitive Integrated Employment and Music Building provides the additional space we need.

The 5,000 sq.ft. building addresses the specific needs of both programs. In CIE, we were able to create an environment that closely models the work conditions the students will see later in life. This addition allows us to keep up with the need for and quality of our services to set our students on a path to greater independence.







Project Overview

Design specifically for Competitive Integrated Employment and Music programs

• The CIE area is modeled like a typical workplace with multiple work areas as well as a break room. This allows students to learn the workplace social rules and generalize skills in different settings.

Open up more space for classrooms

• The expansion creates capacity for additional classrooms to meet our needs well into the future.

Create opportunity for learning and expression through the arts

• Our music program provides an outlet for our students to express themselves and learn in a new way.

Help meet the need for job training

 In order for our students to compete in the workforce, they must find work they enjoy and excel in. The CIE program gives students this opportunity through classroom work, school-based internships and communitybased internships.

The new CIE and Music building, which will be completed by the end of April, will help children grow towards a happy, independent life by holding a space where they can learn job skills and channel their creativity through the arts.
